My dear Miss Grimm:






My dear Miss Grimm:

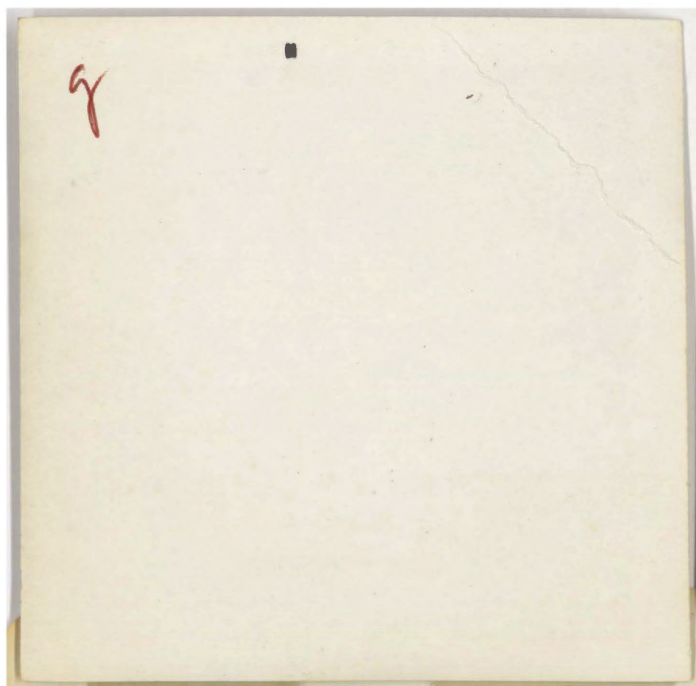


