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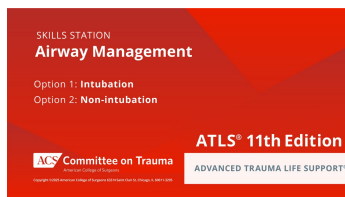

## ATLS 11 Is Getting Closer to Launch

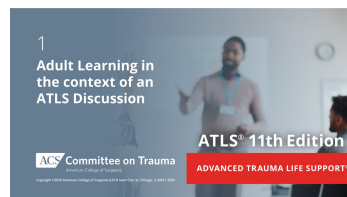
Development of the **Advanced Trauma Life Support® (ATLS®), 11th Edition** continues to move forward, and the course is expected to launch this summer. Traditional course pilots will start in April, and hybrid course pilots will begin in June. By the end of July, the ATLS traditional course will be available in English, Spanish, and Brazilian Portuguese. The hybrid course will launch shortly thereafter. 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## Online Update Course Is Required

All Course Directors, Instructors, Educators, and Coordinators will be required to complete an online update course. In some cases, sites will provide in-person training to cover the content. The updates will be simple and brief, while providing the information and guidance needed to offer this next edition successfully. Look out for additional updates over the next few months and/or refer to the ATLS 11 website periodically for new

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## Consider Alternative Pathways to Becoming ATLS Educator

Across the globe, there is a significant shortage of ATLS Educators. The role of the ATLS Educator is critical to the development of highly skilled ATLS instructors who are grounded in adult education principles and practices. Educator candidates are assessed using a matrix of requirements such as their training and experience in adult education and clinical care. Two groups of educator candidates who may not meet all criteria, but should have a pathway to become ATLS Educators are:

- Experienced clinicians who are actively engaged in teaching ATLS/Advanced Trauma Care for Nurses and who serve as educators for students, residents, and/or colleagues/faculty in their institutions but lack formal training in education
- Advanced educators who have advanced training and experience in education (e.g., EdD, MEd) but lack clinical experience

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## Check Out New RTTDC Course Guide

Streamlined training for new Rural Trauma Team Development Course (RTTDC) Coordinators, Facilitators, and Faculty is now available. In recognition of your busy schedules, this online guide replaces the required webinar training for conducting an RTTDC course and includes updates for using the Course Management System (CMS). Completion of this brief, self-enrolled course is required for all new members of RTTDC staff and recommended for all current Coordinators, Facilitators, and Faculty. The course includes downloadable PDFs of pertinent information and informs of all changes involved with transition to the CMS. # ATLS Global Symposium

The 2025 Global Symposium, held March 14–16 in Chicago, IL, was a huge success. More than 400 individuals participated, representing every US state and 48 countries. Specific program tracks were offered for ATLS Coordinators and Educators. While a main focus was on the ATLS 11th edition, there were several high-quality presentations within the following themes: Innovative education, using trauma education to enhance patient care outcomes, flexing trauma education, and using education to create community. In addition, Dany Westerband, MD, FACS, ATLS International Program Director, moderated a session on fostering successful Global ATLS Programs, and Andrew R. Baker, MD, FACS, South African ATLS Country Chair, moderated the Plenary Panel Session, “All Things Trauma Education.”
