Opportunities for Improvement and Lessons Learned from Prior Site Visits Standards 5.7 and 5.8

Opportunities for Improvement Identified During Site Visits

Standard 5.7 (Total Mesorectal Excision)

- Facilities not using most recent version of CAP report (missing TME completeness)
- Incomplete excision of the mesorectum
- Location and evaluation of mesorectum missing
- Pathology reports did not address the intactness of mesorectum

Opportunities for Improvement Identified During Site Visits

Standard 5.8 (Pulmonary Resection)

- Failure of surgeons to remove/identify required nodal stations
- Inadequate number of nodes from required stations (either no nodes removed, or fewer stations than required for mediastinal and/or hilar nodes)
- Stations not listed in pulmonary resection synoptic pathology reports
- Nodes grouped rather than named by site
- Information included not in synoptic format
- Nodes from mediastinoscopy were not documented in same pathology report as the curative resection

Lessons Learned

Strategies for achieving compliance with Standards 5.7 and 5.8

- Performing internal audits in preparation for the site visit
- Education, awareness, communication with surgeons/pathologists (share CSSP resources, STS webinar, etc.)
- Ensure thoracic and colorectal representation at tumor board
- Use most recent versions of CAP reports
- Create an internal review process to track reports
- Provide a checklist and pre-labeled specimen cups in OR to use and remind surgeons of the need for mediastinal sampling and TME completeness as necessary

Survey Results

2022 CTR/CPA Survey on Implementation of CoC Operative Standards: Overview

- Survey of registrars and administrators at cancer programs designed to:
 - Provide insight on the awareness of the CoC Operative Standards
 - Understand the experiences of registrars and administrators with the implementation of the CoC Operative Standards
 - Understand engagement with other stakeholders (CLPs, IT staff, etc.) for implementation
- Survey open 10/6/22-10/21/22

2022 CTR/CPA Survey on Implementation of CoC Operative Standards: Results

- 305 Respondents
- 44% of respondents were part of a hospital network
- 50% of respondents indicated that their CLP is a surgeon
- 55% of respondents identified as CTRs and 30% as cancer program administrators
- 65% of respondents were due for a site visit in 2023 or 2024
- Programs visited in 2022 felt prepared with the surgical standards
 - More programs (38%) felt the need to act to improve Standard 5.8 (both documentation and technical aspects), which may correlate with 5.8 survey deficiencies
- 82% of respondents were involved in the implementation of SORs at their facility

2022 CTR/CPA Survey on Implementation of CoC Operative Standards: Summary

- About 30% of programs were still working on an implementation plan at the time of the survey (fall 2022)
- 23% of respondents indicated either no engagement or unknown engagement of the IT team at their facility
- About 70% of CLPs were engaged with implementation of the standards

2022 CTR/CPA Survey on implementation of CoC Operative Standards: Conclusions

- Access to implementation resources and physician champions are helpful
- Cancer registrars and cancer program administrators are highly involved in implementation of required synoptic elements in operative reports

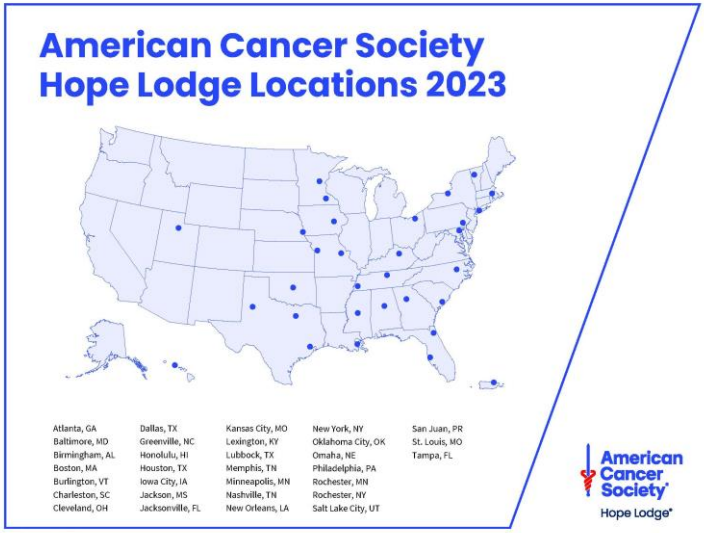

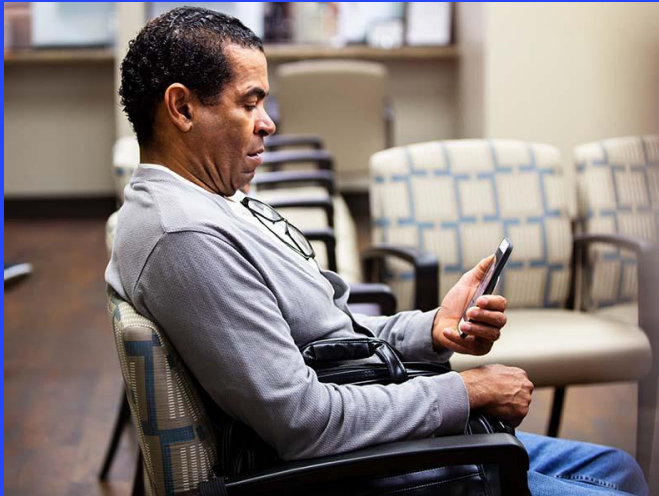

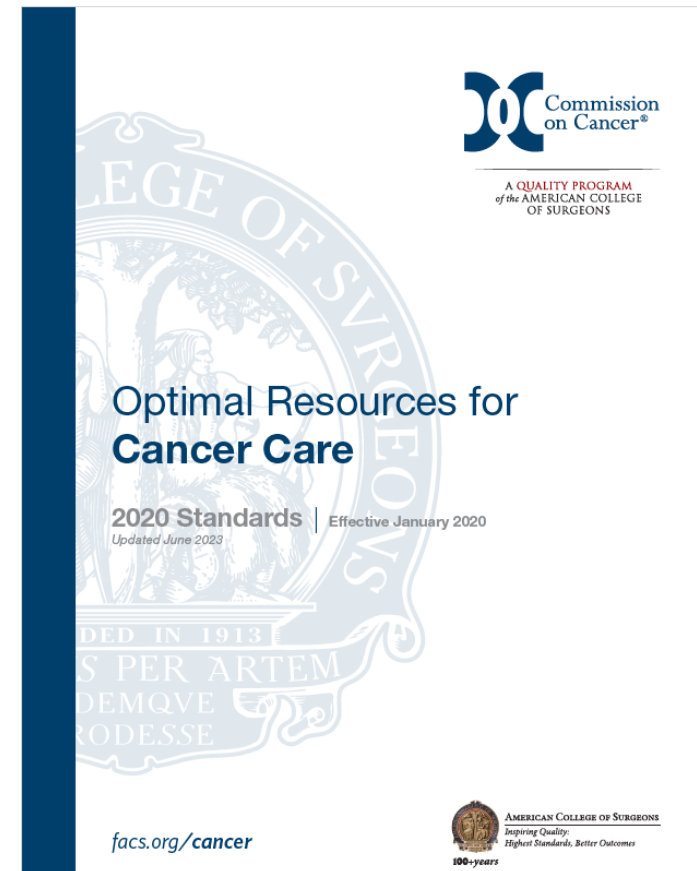


2024 Compliance Updates

New Standards In Effect for PCP, INCP/NCIN Categories

- New requirements were to be implemented January 1, 2023
- Detailed in the *Specifications by Category* section of the *Optimal Resources for Cancer Care (2020 Standards)*



Standard 3.2: Evaluation & Treatment Services

Starting January 1, 2024

- Must be able to demonstrate accreditation for anatomic pathology
- Ex: CAP, A2LA, ACHC, Joint Commission, COLA



Standard 4.2: Oncology Nursing Credentials



- Submit the template outlining nursing credentials/education
- If you aren't compliant with the standard—create an action plan and get it documented in your cancer committee minutes ASAP

Standard 5.1: CAP Synoptic Reporting

Starting January 1, 2024

- 2023 activity will not be reviewed for 5.1
- Standard 5.1 will not be reviewed at 2024 Site Visits
- Site Reviewer will no longer review pathology reports for compliance with CAP protocols (but still reviewing path reports for 5.7-5.8)

New Requirements:

- Must perform an internal audit each year
- 20 path reports from at least 3 different cancer sites
- If 90% of reports don't meet CAP requirements (elements/synoptic format)—
action plan required

Standard 5.5 Updates

Wide Local Excision for Cutaneous Melanoma

- Only applies to the first wide local excision performed with curative intent after diagnostic excisional biopsy
- Repeat wide local excisions being performed for involved/close margins are outside the scope of standard
- Does not apply to Mohs technique

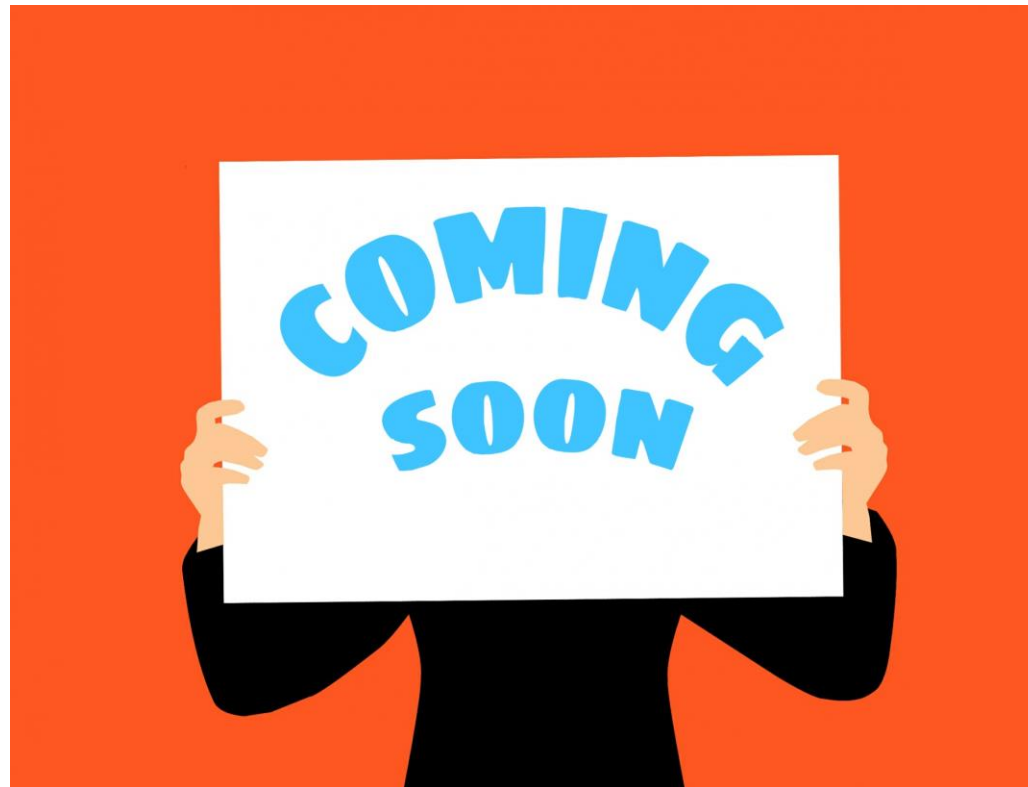
Standard 7.1: Quality Measures

- 2023 activity not reviewed at future site visits
- 2024 activity TBD.
- Update with details will be provided in Cancer Program News before the end of the calendar year



Operative Standards Review at 2024 Site Visits

Standards 5.3-5.6 being reviewed during site visits for the first time

- Programs provide list of all eligible patients that fit within the scope of standard

- The following patients who underwent the following procedures in 2023 must be included in the list:
 - Nodal staging operations for breast cancer of epithelial origin
 - Axillary lymph node dissections for breast cancer of epithelial origin
 - Wide local excision of primary cutaneous melanoma lesions, excluding mucosal, ocular, and subungual melanomas
 - Resections for colon adenocarcinoma
- The following patients who underwent the following procedures in 2021, 2022, and 2023 must be included in the list:
 - Radical, anatomic operations for rectal adenocarcinoma, excluding in-situ lesions and primary resection specimens with no residual cancer
 - Primary pulmonary resections for non-small cell lung cancer, small cell lung cancer, and carcinoid tumors of the lung
- For INCPs and NCINs, the list must contain cases for each facility and include the individual facility name and FIN.

Operative Standards Review at 2024 Site Visits

Standards 5.3-5.6 being reviewed during site visits for the first time

- Site Reviewer will select 7 cases for each standard
 - If a selected patient does not meet scope of standard—TELL THE REVIEWER
 - Whoever is preparing the records may need assistance with determining whether the patient meets the scope of standard

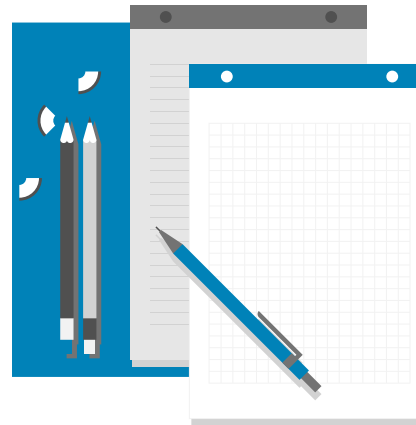
