# Kaiser Permanente Mid-Atlantic States (KPMAS) Physician Assistant Led Cancer Survivorship Program Multispecialty Outpatient Ambulatory Health System Experience

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#### What is it?

- Physician Assistant (PA) led Cancer Survivorship Program (CSP)
- To provide ongoing surveillance for colon and non-small cell lung cancer (NSCLC) patients in line with the National Comprehensive Cancer Network (NCCN) Guidelines

# Eligibility Criteria:

- Colon and NSCLC patients, stage I-III
- Completed primary treatment
- Shows no evidence of disease

#### How is it done?

- An Electronic Health Records (Kaiser Permanente Health Connect, KPHC) report identifies eligible patients
- Cancer Survivorship Tracking Tool tracks NCCNrecommended surveillance, such as colonoscopy and imaging
- PA provides surveillance care based on NCCN recommended guidelines
- PA is supervised by a surgeon, guided by medical oncology chiefs and supported by technology integration team


#### What has been done?

- September 1, 2023, to August 30, 2024
- 489 colon cancer and 139 NSCLC patients received NCCNrecommended surveillance
- Conducted 1,723 telephone encounters, 91 orders, 29 letters, and 180 other encounters

#### Lessons Learned

- With the PA heading the CSP and manages the surveillance, physicians can focus on new and active patients
- Staging is crucial, as NCCN guidelines depend on it
- Unstaged cancers were identified, and a corrective action strategy was developed with input from medical oncologists, surgeons, and the cancer committee leaders
